

## Puzon's talk at the Virtual International Conference

Library and Information Science (LIS) professionals and students converged in the maiden edition of the "Virtual International Conference on Library Information Science (VICLIS)" 2021 which was held on August 23, 2021, via Zoom. The event was organized by the Sri Lanka Technological Campus (SLTC), Department of Library Information Science, University of Kelaniya Sri Lanka, National Science Library and Resource Centre (NSLRC), National Science

Foundation of Sri Lanka, and the Department of Library and Information Science, University of Kerala, India. With the theme, "Challenges of Library and Information Science Profession in New Normal Context," the conference aimed to provide a venue for LIS practitioners, researchers, scholars, and students to share experiences, likewise, make known the results of their research covering numerous aspects of librarianship.

Among the one hundred four (104) speakers divided into seven (7) different tracks in the Parallel Technical Sessions, Edward Puzon, head librarian of the Graduate School Section, represented the University of Santo Tomas (UST) Miguel de Benavides Library and presented his paper, "How Turnitin is Turning Out: the User Experience of Graduate Students of the University of Santo Tomas, Philippines" specifically in Track 1: Leadership, Professional Ethics, and Accountability in Librarianship. Mr. Puzon shared how the innovative use of the Turnitin software, offered by the UST Library as a remote service in peri-pandemic times, was characterized and viewed by a select group of graduate students. The students' user experience was vividly captured and visually displayed through the model dubbed "The Spheres of Graduate Students Library Turnitin User Experience." Findings from the qualitative study revealed users of the online service collectively experience concerns about the results of their work, but through the pronounced involvement of the librarian as the facilitator of the process by demonstrating and instructing proper techniques in paraphrasing and citing, issues are alleviated. Students seemingly enjoy the various benefits the service and assistance provide leading to user satisfaction and to what one might describe as an impactful library encounter.

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Eng. Ranjith Rubasinghe, president/CEO of SLTC, delivered the opening remarks. It was followed by the addresses of the guests of honor, Prof. Nilanthi De Silva, senior professor & vice-chancellor of the University of Kelaniya, Sri Lanka, and Prof. Ranjith Senarathne, chairman of The National Science Foundation, Sri Lanka. IFLA President, Christine Mackenzie FALIA, graced the event with a speech. Keynote address from Prof. Anne Goulding, professor of Library and Information Management at the Victoria University Wellington in New Zealand, and from Dr. Raymond Pun, president of the Asian Pacific American Librarians Association (APALA) subsequently came after. The International Conference was host to a diverse audience coming from different countries which included presenters from Sri Lanka, Nigeria, India, Bangladesh, Malaysia, Thailand, Ghana, Qatar, Indonesia, Hungary, and Pakistan. Other tracks included: Social Networking and Library Services (Track 2); Collection Development, Resource Sharing and Accessibility (Track 3); Emerging Technological Trend in Libraries (Track 4); Library and Allied Services for Differently-Abled Users (Track 5); Re-designing the Library and Information Centers (Track 6); and Novel Issues, Challenges, and Remedies During the Pandemic Period (Track 7).

The affair afforded an interdisciplinary platform for participants to have meaningful discussions among peers on trends, problems, and solutions adopted surrounding varied concerns in the library field. Likewise, it has raised awareness of the challenges libraries situated in different parts of the world encounter in this so-called "new normal." Notably, the Conference allowed for the enhancement and strengthening of professional networks between and among librarians in attendance.

Hasitha Koralage, the Conference coordinator expressed her profound gratitude to the more than three hundred (300) participants from twenty (20) countries that took part in the inaugural event.

## Conversations at USTMdBLib: the official podcast

We also wanted to broaden the reach of the Library in terms of marketing and promoting our services, resources, and profession.

Four topic proposals were selected for presentation in the UST Library Learning Sessions as part of the Library and Information Services (LIS) month celebration last November 2021.

The first two sessions were held on November 10, 2021, with topics 'The Proposed Guide to Boolean Search on UST Library Search Platforms and Electronic Databases' was presented by Civil Law Section Head, Jonas T. Sahagun, RL, and 'Media and Information Literacy: UNESCO-GAPMIL Response to COVID-19' by Senior High School Library Asst. Head, Rose Anne Camille C. Dionisio, RL.

The third session was held on November 17, 2021, on the topic 'How is Turnitin Turning Out? The Thomasian Graduate Student User Experience' presented by Graduate School Section Head, Edward H. Puzon, RL, and was opened to the Thomasian community to promote the Turnitin service offered by the Library.

The fourth and last learning session was held last November 24, 2021, on 'Citing Yourself: Updates on the 7th APA Citation and Referencing'. Science and Technology Section Asst. Head, Kristi Ma. Fevie V. Macasaet-Recinto, RL, presented the topic. It was also opened to the Thomasian community to familiarize them with citing sources in APA Citation format.

The learning sessions were held via the Zoom platform. The Committee is dedicated to providing meaningful and valuable online learning sessions for the training and development of the library staff in this new normal of teaching and learning mode.

The event even looked like an online cosplay parade due to their efforts to dress up which made the activity 'one for the books'.

## **UST Library coordinators for** AY 2021-2022


