

UST LIBRARY - FROM MILLENNIUM TO SIERRA

The UST Miguel de Benavides Library has been using the *Millennium* library system since 2003. With the current trends and recent developments in the field of information technology in relation to library services and operations, the library decided to upgrade its *Millennium* library system to *Sierra* which was completed last February 2016.

Sierra, a new development of Innovative, provides a powerful and modern foundation on which to build the future of library services. Combining complete functionality with the power and scale of an open services platform, it frees librarians to create the kind of patron experience and management solution they've always wanted. It also offers trusted business 1 o g i c and flexible workflow support, including circulation, cataloging, acquisitions, patron management, serials handling, and accounting management, in a unified staff application. Powered by a Postgre SQL database, *Sierra* opens opportunities for integrating the library with critical systems and data, offering the flexibility libraries need to customize service offerings and meet evolving needs.

Last February 2, 2016, Ms. Eva Lachonius of Innovative Interfaces arrived in the Philippines to conduct a three-day onsite training of *Sierra* to the UST librarians and support staff. The emphasis is on the use of all the modules – Administration, Acquisitions, Cataloging, Circulation and Serials Management from February 3-5, 2016. Ms. Lachonius is a Swedish librarian (30 years in the profession) and has worked for Innovative as a trainer for 15 years. Her job title is Senior Library Training Consultant.

The development of libraries in terms of technology is very fast, thus, upgrades from time to time is highly expected to provide better services for library patrons. Having moved up to a new system called *Sierra*, the UST Miguel de Benavides Library can now serve its patron with improved ease and speed.

The objective for this meeting was to introduce Emerald's products and services d i s c u s s e d by Carlos Lagrosas Eclevia, Jr., RL, business manager – Philippines; and as to how on-boarding will benefit the libraries and institutions in the long run was discussed by Rozita Gee, marketing manager-East Asia Region.

Emerald is a global publisher linking research and practice to the benefit of society. COUNTER is a not-for-profit organization formed in 2002 to develop standardized methods and reports for measuring the use of electronic resources. COUNTER created Codes of Practice, which define how to count and record usage, and the fields, formats, schedule of reports and protocols for combining usage reports from direct use and from use via intermediaries.

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Collection analysis and evaluation

The Philippine Association of Academic/ Research L i b r a r i a n s, Inc. (PAARL), sponsored the 2nd Marina G. Dayrit Lecture series last March 11, 2016. It was held at the Ateneo de Manila U n i v e r s i t y, Loyola Heights, Quezon City. It was entitled "Collection Analysis and Evaluation: Fundamentals of Collection-centered A s s e s s m e n t Techniques." The resource speaker was Ms. Marilou Andres, a professor and college l i b r a r i a n from Pangasinan State University in Urdaneta, Pangasian.

The topics discussed during the lecture-forum were:

- definition of assessment and evaluation;
- factors to consider in the assessment and evaluation of the collection;
- tools in evaluating and assessing the collection;
- difference between qualitative and quantitative method;

- d i f f e r e n t styles/approaches in assessing/ evaluating the collection; and
- different standards applied by the different accreditors.

An open forum followed wherein some librarians asked the speaker to give her opinion of which is the most effective approach in evaluating the library collection. According to the speaker, it depends on the situations and needs of the library. It is the role of the librarian to determine his/her own technique that is applicable to his/her library. One librarian raised a question addressed to the members of the accreditation agency such as the PAARL and the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities Commission on A c c r e d i t a t i o n (PACU-COA). According to Prof. Teresita Hernandez-Calma, P A C U - C O A accreditor, it depends on the instruments they have

s the Continuing Professional Education Bill makes its way to becoming a law, which mandates professionals to complete credit units as requirement before renewing their licences, and as the Philippine Librarianship Act of 2003 marked its 13th year, the Philippine Librarians Association, Inc. (PLAI) organized the first ever Philippine Librarians Summit held last March 17-18, 2016. Two librarians of the UST Miguel de Benavides Library, Sabina Viernes and Ma.Victoria C. Acuña attended the said summit. This activity addressed issues and concerns faced by the library and information professionals in the different s e c t o r s. Invited speakers were representatives f r o m concerned government agencies like Commission on Higher Education (CHED), Commission on Audit (COA), Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG), Profession al Regulation Commission (PRC), Department of Education (DepEd), and Civil S e r v i c e Commission (CSC). Focus group discussions were also held to complement the open forum and to further discuss issues and possible solutions to the problems presented. The group came up with an action agenda, which is one of the main objectives of the summit.

'CELPh' updates

The 16th meeting and 1st General Assembly of the Consortium of Engineering Libraries – Philippines (CELPh) was held last March 18, 2016 at the Conference Room of the Rizal Library, Ateneo de Manila University in Loyola Heights, Quezon City.

The presiding officer during the event was the incumbent President Ms. Concepcion DL. Saul of the University of the Philippines Los Baños (UPLB). One of the items that was discussed during the meeting was the update of the Wiley e-books. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Wiley Subscription Services Inc. and the eleven (11) member institutions of the CELPh was signed in October 2015. Each institution will select and purchase Wiley online books and will pay the shared access fee so that all members of the consortium will be able to access other online books.

During the meeting, recent updates on Wiley e-books access were shared by Ms. Sharon Esposo-Betan of the College of Engineering of UP Diliman. She mentioned that among the eleven (11) member institutions, only five (5) institutions can already access Wiley e-books, namely, De La Salle University (DLSU), Ateneo De Manila University (ADMU), University of Santo Tomas (UST), Xavier University (XU), and University of San Carlos (USC). The rest of the consortium members cannot yet access the database because the payment papers are still with their respective institutional corporate accounting/finance offices. They are: UPLB, UP Diliman, Technological Institute of the Philippines (TIP), Mapua Institute of Technology (MIT), Central Luzon State University (CLSU) and M i n d a n a o State University - Iligan Institute of Technology (MSU-IIT).

Ms. Betan also stated that this "consortium purchase model" is the start and will serve as a pilot test for other providers/publishers to offer similar package. There are also some institutions with engineering programs that have signified their interest in joining this consortium. Fortunately, all the eleven consortium members participated in the

To further elaborate the topics discussed by Ms. Andres, the library director from De la Salle University, Ms. Maria Anna Fresnido, summed up the different pointers/strategies and techniques of assessing/ evaluating the library collection and ways to apply them in one's library. She also mentioned that in her own library, she designed her style and programs in assessing/evaluating her library collection.

The event was successful and well attended by librarians including yours truly, students and teachers of library and Information Science.

Book launch: "History of leprosy in the Philippines"

Leprosy is no longer a health threat in the country, for it is now a curable disease. The National Historical Commission of the Philippines (NCHP), headed by Ms. Maria Serena I. Diokno, came up with a book entitled, "Hidden lives, concealed narratives : a history of leprosy in the Philippines." It was launched last February 17, 2016 at the NHCP building, T.M. Kalaw Street, Manila. The book launch took place during the observance of "Leprosy Week." Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) Secretary Corazon J. Soliman was the guest of honor.

The book presents series of papers written by various notable historians about the history of leprosy from the earliest period to the present. It is known as the first book about the history of Leprosy in the Philippines. The project was supported by the Sasakawa Foundation from Japan.

During the book launch, the Philippine Postal Corporation also launched a special commemorative stamp highlighting the arrival of the first Filipinos brought to the Culion Leper Colony in Palawan.

A faculty member from the University of Santo Tomas, Assoc. Prof. Maria Eloisa P. de Castro, Ph.D. from the Faculty of Arts and L e t t e r s, authored a chapter entitled "Rediscovering a Paradigm: t h e Franciscan Order's response to leprosy and the afflicted in the Philippines, 1578-1898."

Several guests including yours truly attended the event. Notable personalities in health organizations, historians, educators, and even cured leprosy patients were also present which rendered authenticity to the gathering.

HEALTH SCIENCES LIBRARY: a major "facelift"

It was in December of 2015 when improvements in the Health Sciences Library started. Many, particularly the students, had been inconvenienced by this. After two months of hammering, drilling, and welding, peace and quiet have once again been restored to the place.

The staff in the Health Sciences Library tried to accommodate the library users, making them feel comfortable even with a minimal space available. But the experience was not the same as when one actually moves freely in the library without interruptions.

The Library does continuous improvements but the one of the Health Sciences actually sprung forth from the recommendations made by the accreditors who constantly make productive evaluation of the library conditions.

After the renovation had been completed, the place was blessed last March 30, 2016. The library atmosphere is now far from the previous; such enhancements include:

- walls and ceiling have been repainted
- additional new shelves (more sturdy) to accommodate the growing collection
- remodelled tables and carrels
- additional new chairs
- window-type airconditiong units have been replaced by split-type (7 new ones)
- windows are provided with roller blinds
- lighting fixtures (some are new; others have just been re-aligned to go with the arrangement of the shelves)
- counter has been re-designed (removing the partition between the head librarian's office and the counter so that the head librarian can oversee better the different operations and movements in the library
- the front of the counter has been provided with carpet complete with newly upholstered sofas for light reading, giving one a more relaxed mood
- chairs in the mezzanine counting to almost 90 have also been re-upholstered

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• a new signage of the Library located just outside, along the hallway fronting the library has been installed, big enough to be identified right away so that people will know that it is the Library area and as such, rules are to be strictly followed.

Although ideas came from the energetic Prefect of Libraries, Fr. Angel Aparicio, O.P., the choice of designs and colors can be attributed mostly to the ever reliable friend of the library, Ms. Ma. Teresa Fenix, a retired faculty member from CFAD, who had meticulously gone through the details of every item.

It was worth mentioning the presence of the administrators of the three colleges served by the Health Sciences Library (Faculty of Medicine & Surgery, College of Nursing and the College of Physical Therapy). Their presence was enough inspiration to the students who were present during the blessing. It only shows that they are one with us in the belief that library is an important component of the students' academic life.

The Library Administration is grateful to the library staff who have been working hard to satisfy the academe's quest for knowledge. Special mention for that particular activity are the staff of the Health Sciences Library headed by Ms. Anna Rita L. Alomo. The janitors were also a big help in transporting books and furniture here and there during the process.

The place is not the library of the administrators nor of the Miguel de Benavides staff. It is the library of the Thomasian community especially students and faculty members! The Library staff are just the humble custodians who organize the library and its resources so that the library users may have the maximum accessibility, thus enabling them to advance in their learning experiences.

am an obstetrician-gynecologist by craft, a teacher out of gratitude to my mentors, a library coordinator due to force majeure – the Dean said I should be the one. Very likely the decision was drawn from my link to printed work, having been with campus publications for most of my extracurricular life. Thus: n e w s p a p e r s, journals, books ... library.

Two pages of duties and responsibilities came with the appointment. I would be the liaison between the Miguel de Benavides Library and the Faculty of Medicine and Surgery (FMS). After the fairs, when the publishers transfer their exhibits to the Benavides branches, I invite the Chairpersons of the different departments, to browse the biglot.

Most Chairs do gamely come and/or send their supervisors of subjects to the Library at the 4th floor of Martin de Porres Building to examine the items and recommend selections for requisition. By the way, they also responded promptly when we called for updating the subscription list to medical journals (which weigh in as much as do books in the budget allocation for FMS), and for weeding out obsolete titles in each subject's collection. As there are some 28 departments, such cooperation from colleagues is laudable and for me, truly heartwarming .

A formidable duty has been that of heading the college's Library Committee, who would therefore lead the team covering Area 6 - Library at accreditation visits. FMS has been scrutinized by the PAASCU twice in my term. One had to know first-hand and thoroughly about administration and staffing, financial support, holdings, organization and maintenance of collection, services, management information and physical facilities. Then, evidence of our efficiency and efficacy in all those aspects had to be documented. Finally, I had to meet the Area Accreditor, i.e. be grilled alongside the Health Sciences head librarian. Beyond a few pounds lost and darker eyebags, we came out intact - in fact, shining - from that grinding process.

At least twice a year, we coordinators are called to a meeting at the Central Library. University-level undertakings are taken up and college-level concerns presented. I look forward to those meetings for they serve to recharge me. My distinct responsibility in the big whole is clarified. My direction is set right, my bearings fine-tuned as Fr. Angel Aparicio, OP and Ms. Estrella Majuelo explain whys and wherefores. I derive much-needed vigor from the company - younger folks brimming with fresh ideas and contagious zeal. All those boosters I need, for it is indeed a tough task, drawing gadget-worshippers to a physical 21st century academic library like the Miguel de Benavides Library.
