Evangelization and Librarianship

The University of Santo Tomas was very fortunate to be selected as the venue of the "First Philippine Conference on New Evangelization" (PCNE). This was held from October 16-18, 2013 at the University of Santo Tomas Quadricentennial Pavilion. The Conference started with the solemn entrance of the image of Jesus Christ on the Cross symbolically carried by selected delegates to a designated portion near a circular altar on a stage glowing in Thomasian colors. A fitting start! After all, Jesus is the reason for the 1st PCNE whom all new evangelization efforts emanate.

Inception. The opening with the Misa ng Bayang Pilipino, His Eminence Luis Antonio G. Cardinal Tagle, D.D., in his homily, drew from the ruins of the churches in Bohol and Cebu destroyed by an earthquake the day before to figuratively call on the faithful to "rebuild and build the church." He said that the main idea of PCNE is the participant's humble contribution to the construction and strengthening of the church.

Rev. Fr. Herminio V. Dagohoy, O.P., UST rector, in his welcome message, jokingly said to participants "welcome to our victory party," alluding to the just concluded University Athletic Association of the Philippines (UAAP) finals between UST and De La Salle University. Losing in the finals may have hurt but UST was so grateful and blessed to have hosted this milestone event in the Philippine church.

Plenary and parallel sessions. From the list of activities that were outlined for the PCNE, it is not difficult to realize the richness of the conference. With parallel sessions called the Streams of Encounter with God, the Pathways of Communion and Renewal and the Wellsprings of Hope so full of reflections and sharing of new ways of evangelizations, one wished he could have attended all of them. The plenary sessions alone were full of inspiration and lessons.

Instead of the usual keynote addresses, there were heart-to-heart talks and testimonies with popular personalities, with no less than Cardinal Tagle being the host of a mini-talk show on the first day. Tina Monzon Palma, Mike Enriquez, Charito Manglapus, Amelia Bulabos, Dr. Nora Luceno and Michael Lagarse each shared his/her insights about faith in the context of new evangelization.

Day 2. Archbishop Emeritus Leonardo Z. Legaspi, D.D., Msgr. Jose Clemente Ignacio, Christopher de Leon, Coco Martin and Judy Ann Santos each shared his/her special devotions tracing their own life-changing experiences of how they were touched by God to become devotees. Fr. Nono Alfonso, S.J., and Ms. Boots Anson-Roa served as moderators during the sharing.

On the third day, instead of Cardinal Tagle speaking on Missionary Dimension of Evangelization, he called on foreign delegates: Bishop Cornelius Christopher Sim of

In cooperation with over three-hundred (300) exhibitors, including the UST Publishing House, the MIBF showcases the largest and most varied collections of literature, textbooks, educational supplements, general references, religious and inspirational titles, self-help books, management books, Filipiniana, coffee table books, popular novels, children's books, art books, graphic novels, rare and hard-to-find titles, magazines, audio and e-books, multimedia, teaching supplies and services, publishers' technology and travel materials.

Some of the special activities during the five-day event were: storytelling, poetry reading, book launching and signing, literary awards, quiz bee, interactive display, dialogues with readers, and Bible quiz. Co-events were "the Best of Anime" to draw Japanese culture enthusiasts; "Educare Conference" for parents, teachers, school administrators and child psychologists; and "National Conference on Language and Literature" that gathered scholars, educators and writers.

To the organizers, our heartfelt congratulations and may you continue to instill in every individual the importance of reading books. We look forward to another exciting year of MIBF.

with the aim to enlighten the librarians and information professionals on their role in the media industry and to provide them insights coming from a TV/media personality on how the library and its information help them in their field, the Association of Special Libraries of the Philippines, Inc. (ASLP) in partnership with Primetrade Asia, Inc. sponsored a forum entitled "Information and Media: the Role of the Library in the Re-shaping of Information." It was held at the SMX Convention Center in Pasay City during the 34th Manila International Book Fair. Mr. Jose Javier Reyes a renowned director and a professor at the De La Salle University, chose to deliver his talk in the traditional way - without the use of presentation tools like PowerPoint. In his own words, he opted to make himself the audiovisual spectacle that he is. Allow me to quote exactly what this famous director had lectured since I believe, there is so much truth in what he said, thinks and believes.

Direk Joey, as he is popularly known, began his dynamic talk by musing at the fact that the encyclopedias are now replaced by Google and books nowadays are read out of reading requirement. All this is due to mass media, which is very prevalent. He compared the present state as being a prisoner. At present, people mistake volumes of information that they absorb as equivalent to knowledge – media does not give them time to synthesize. The capability to analyze and synthesize are the things lost when they cease to read.

He further stressed that media pre-conditions people's minds. A search in the Internet would yield numerous results. One is given the illusion that everything is summarized in just a few pages. Media, in his observation, has now become an institution in this country. One simply accepts the things it gives and no longer thinks.

As a staunch advocate of reading, he shared that he would often tell his students to read. Most would come up with the excuse that they would rather watch for they do not have the time to read. As a result, people

forum entitled "Fit or fat: how to have a healthy lifestyle" was organized by the Medical and Health Librarians Association of the Philippines (MAHLAP) in coordination with Primetrade Asia, Inc. during the celebration of the 34th Manila International Book Fair held last September 11, 2013 at the SMX Convention Center in Pasay.

Invited speaker was Dr. Enrique A. Tayag, the current Associate Secretary of the Department of Health (DOH), who shared his knowledge on how to have a healthy and balanced lifestyle. According to him, study shows that the causes of death nowadays are not because of communicable diseases but complications of having unhealthy lifestyle. He enumerated some tips on how to achieve a healthy body and how to avoid diseases in order to lengthen one's life span.

*Tips on how to have a healthy lifestyle:

1. Cut-off carbs intake.

Rice and white bread are source of carbohydrates. Avoid eating too much of these especially at night. If possible, eat moderately in the morning and lunch, and eat just only one hard-boiled egg at night.

- 2. Avoid sweets.
 - Softdrinks, chocolates, and sugar-rich foods must be avoided. Donuts should not be eaten often because basically it has not much nutrients.
- 3. Consume Breakfast Regularly / Never skip meals Known as the "most important meal of the day," it's no surprise that eating breakfast is a healthy lifestyle choice.
- 4. Exercise atleast 30 minutes daily.

Yes, you read it right. 30 minutes of continuous exercise daily. Brisk walking or doing house chores are not considered as exercise. Those are regular activities of individuals. Jogging, treadmills, biking are some of the exercises that he recommended.

- 5. Eat organic.
- 6. Avoid excessive alcohol drinking.
- 7. Get enough sleep.
- 8. Eat healthy fats in moderation.

Poly-unsaturated, mono-unsaturated and omega-3 fats are all good lifestyle choices. These good fats

lower your LDL cholesterol and raise your HDL cholesterol, which correlates with decreased risk for heart disease.

Libraries design considerations

ast September 13 2013, Ms. Juanita Subaldo, head librarian of the Humanities Section and Mr. Maynard Vitug, librarian of the Social Sciences Section, were fortunate to be given the opportunity by the UST Library to attend the seminar titled "Collaborative Learning Spaces in Libraries: Design Considerations." This was held during the 34th Manila International Book Fair (MIBF) at the SM Mall of Asia in Pasay City. The activity was organized by the Philippine Librarians Association (PLAI) and its local chapter, the National Capital Region Librarians Council (PLAI-NCRLC), to update library professionals and Library and Information Science (LIS) students about the latest trends in librarianship.

The resource speaker who gave a talk and likewise shared the personal journey of their library on the adoption of the concept of learning commons was none other than the current Director of De La Salle University-Manila Library, Ms. Ana Maria B. Fresnido. The topic was very timely considering that many

librarians nowadays are getting more open to the idea of transforming present libraries into information resource centers of the future.

Through a PowerPoint, Ms. Fresnido began her presentation on the current trends in learning space designs and then the catalysis of these trends like constructivism, digital technology and the holistic view of learning. To gain a better understanding of the topic, she posed a question to the attendees as to why librarians should reinvent or redefine library's space design and consequently explained that it is due to the continuous evolvement of digital technology. To get familiarized, she also shared about the common terms for libraries of today like learning commons, in f o r m a t i o n commons, knowledge commons, information hub and media union.

From the seminar, the attendees were further informed that the idea about learning commons was

"Sawatdee Kaa" Thailand!

"Sawatdee Kaa," means "hello," a warm greeting to everyone!

Last October 15, 2013, forty eight (48) librarians from the different universities and institutions in the Philippines including Anna Rita L. Alomo as the University of Santo Tomas representative, left for Thailand to participate in a benchmarking tour. This activity was organized by the Philippine Association of Academic and Research Librarians (PAARL) chaired by Ms. Marian Ramos-Eclevia, together with Mr. Sonny Boy Manalo, president of PAARL. "Collaborative Benchmarking Plus 1: the Amazing Bangkok, Thailand Experience" is this year's theme for this international activity.

The first day was the city tour.

On day 2, the group visited the Office of Academic Resources, Chulalongkorn University. They were welcomed by the Thai librarians and convened in one room where they had a short video presentation about Chulalongkorn University and their Library. One of their Thai Librarians discussed the department's organization structure and library strategic plans. They used the system **Innovative Interfaces**, similar to that used by the UST Miguel de Benavides Library. A tour of the place

lectronic resources refer to those materials that require computer access, whether through a personal computer, mainframe or handheld mobile device. They may either be accessed remotely via the Internet or locally. Some of the most frequently encountered types are the following: e-journals, e-books, full-text (aggregated) databases, indexing and abstracting databases, reference databases (biographies, dictionaries, directories, encyclopedias, etc.), numeric and statistical databases, e-images and e-audio/visual resources.

Following the training-seminar on electronic resources last April 18-19, 2013, the General Reference and Information Section headed by Arlene Matias organized a half-day session for the library

coordinators and selected librarians on the "Updates on Library Electronic Resources." The library coordinators who graced the activity were Ms. Mary Jean Ramirez of the Education High School, Dr. Marieta Baysa of the College of Education, Donato Lipaldo of the College of Rehabilitation Sciences and Mr. Bernhard Egwolf from the College of Science. This was held last October 22, 2013 at the Internet Station of the UST Miguel de Benavides Library.

Ms. Weena Alvaran, Marketing Executive, representing McGraw-Hill Education, discussed another future database subscription of the library which is the *McGraw-Hill Access Pharmacy*. This is an online curricular resource designed to meet the changing demands of pharmacy education. A flexible resource, *AccessPharmacy*

Seminar on "Preventive Conservation and Architecture in Museums"

he Embassy of Spain and the Agencia Española de Cooperación Internacional para el Desarrollo (AECID) or the Spanish Agency for International Development and Cooperation, with the collaboration of the Spanish Ministry of Education, Culture and Sports through the ACERCA Program (Training Program for the Development of the Cultural Sector), and their local counterparts, the San Agustin Museum, the National Commission for Culture and the Arts (NCCA), the Intramuros Administration and Escuela Taller, have sponsored a five-day course seminar on "Preventive Conservation and Architecture in Museums Exposed to Tropical and Sub-tropical Climates." It was held from October 21 to 25, 2013 at the San Agustin Museum in Intramuros, Manila. This was attended mostly by architects, museum curators and workers and also some librarians from different institutions. The said seminar aimed:

- to help the Philippines in preserving the cultural heritage;
- to promote the training of professionals in the cultural field; and
- to enhance their existing knowledge for the collective development of the community specifically in Intramuros, Manila.

Two well-known experts from Spain in the field of conservation and rehabilitation of museums and cultural heritage buildings have been invited. They were: Mr. Victor Cageao, an architect and curator of museums in Spain. He is also the head of the Division for Infrastructures of the Subdirectorate General of State Museums in Spain. The other one was Mr. Juan Antonio Herráez, head of the Preventive Preservation Section of the Research and Training Division of the Spanish Cultural Heritage Institute or the Instituto del Patrimonio Cultural de España (IPCE) and also a coordinator of the National Plan of Preventive Conservation in Spain. Both held a series of talks on architecture conservation. of museums rehabilitation of historical buildings.

On the first day of the seminar, Mr. Vicente Sellés Zaragozi, AECID general coordinator and Fr. Blas de la Sierra, director, Museo Oriental in Valladolid, Spain, gave their opening remarks. This was followed by the opening remarks of Prof. Regalado Trota Jose, head, Sub-commission on Cultural Heritage, NCCA and also the Archivist of the University of Santo Tomas. Prof. Jose raised two main points: cooperation and the Spanish language. He highlighted that conservation is a collaboration of group efforts of the architect, curator, historian, scientist, researcher and

Brunei, Rev. Fr. Dominic Chi Ming Chan of Hongkong, Bishop Berard Toshio Oshikawa of Japan along with her Filipina secretary, Fr. Thomas Madanan of Malaysia, Mr. Wanglat Lowangcha of India and Ms. Clarissa Martinez of Los Angeles, U.S.A. to share their experiences in their journey as missionaries.

Culmination. The 1st PCNE culminated with a Eucharistic celebration presided by Cardinal Tagle and a presentation of the video message of Pope Francis. Symbolized by the lighting of candles of the faithful and singing of the song Tell the World of His Love, the gathering ended with the 'mission-sending', encouraging the participants to renew commitment to spread the light of Christ, tell the world of His story and proclaim God's love to all - Lumina pandit!

Evangelization. The 3-day conference was truly enriching to say the least. Mr. Jonas Sahagun and Ms. Rowena Del Meda were fortunate and grateful to be sent as delegates of the UST Library. Honestly, I came in not expecting much from the experience but came out brimming with inspiration and even, to borrow a word used by Rev. Fr. Catalino Arevalo, S.J. – imagination.

In the video message sent by the Vatican, His Holiness Pope Francis said "Let Jesus speak now in the world of politics, business, arts, science, technology and social media. then agree to the narrowness of perspective that media presents to them. Audiences become passive recipients of frames, images and sounds. They no longer expand their realm of experience through reading.

Moreover, he mentioned that it is unfortunate that media does not give a sense of historical continuity, nor does it promote education in its various forms. Interactive media, in particular, lacks in the fostering of culture. Instead, chat rooms and social networking sites promote a false sense of courage through anonymity.

He underscored that "he who has access to information has the power; more so, he who controls the information has the greatest power." The library should be the people's sanctuary of information. In the eyes of young people though, the library is a place with free Wi-Fi and a place to hang out.

As Filipino people come from a country with a lot of problems, they cannot rely solely on the government. Times are evolving and changing, and these cannot be stopped. It is how these changes and evolution are maximized for the benefit of everyone, most especially the youth. New media makes the agenda of the library adaptable to the way the young people think. This pushes information specialists to be more vigilant. Indeed, everyone shares a responsibility in the re-shaping of information.

I just hope that those who will read this piece of information will be enlightened and will help in changing some distorted notions about <u>information</u> searching.

UST Librarians Jenneth Capule and yours truly together with more than 200 participants from all over the country gained valuable insights from this forum.

- 9. Eat a variety of different whole foods instead of eating processed foods.
 - Eat fruits and vegetables for their high vitamin and mineral content.
 - Choose lean meat, beans and tofu for their protein content.
 - Enjoy whole grains such as whole wheat bread, whole wheat pasta, brown rice and quinoa.
 - Eat low-fat dairy products. Skim milk and reduced fat cheeses will reduce your fat intake while ensuring that you receive enough calcium.
- 10. Stay away from fad diets. Avoid liquid diets, diet pills and other diet supplements unless you are under the supervision of a physician.
- 11. Frequent and routine exercise everyday will boost your immune system. Also, exercise helps to prevent "diseases of affluence" such as heart disease, cancer, diabetes and obesity. Additionally, physical activity also improves your mental outlook and may prevent depression.
- 12. Take a multivitamin to ensure that you are taking in adequate vitamins and minerals.

Dr. Tayag also mentioned the current program of DOH – the **Pilipinas Go4 Health.** The "4" stands for *Go Smoke free*; *Go Sustansya*; *Go Sigla*; *Go Slow sa tagay Pilipinas*. The **Go4 Health** is a nationwide healthy lifestyle movement that aims to inform and engage the youth and adults in forming healthy habits and practicing a healthy lifestyle through the promotion of physical activity, proper nutrition, and the prevention and cessation of smoking and alcohol consumption. Dr. Tayag encourages everyone to join and be a member of this movement by signing up to this website http://www.go4health.ph/.

To seal in the forum, Dr. Tayag led the whole group in dancing. It was indeed a great and healthy day for everyone who attended the forum.

developed in the 1990s and is actually an evolution of information commons, a space where students may gather and work together with technology. It was also given emphasis that users should hold the position of importance when thinking of applying learning commons to libraries. Subsequently, Ms. Fresnido added that the concept of learning commons is not only about libraries but may also pertain to the Registrar, Information Technology (IT) department and other student services. It is in fact a one-stop shop where every need of a student may be met within the confines of a single building.

Before embarking on applying learning commons, the resource speaker advised the participants to initially address the pertinent issues like those librarians without technological know-how and the digital divide to be successful in remodeling a library.

The attendees also learned that there are three levels of learning commons such as: the *physical commons* which refer to books; the *digital commons* or digital library collections and the online or electronic tools; and finally the *cultural commons*, examples of which are the workshops or tutoring programs being conducted by a library.

Additionally, the requisite elements in a learning common was extensively discussed in the seminar, particularly the wireless communication, a flexible workspace that has comfortable furnishings which support peer learning, self-help graphing services, one-stop collaboratory and many others.

To be equipped in designing commons, Ms. Fresnido explained in detail the guiding principles such as the provision for open-use glass walls, a space design where cross-disciplinary exchange of ideas may take place and furnishings which can be freely arranged by the users. Similarly, it should be comfortable for many types of learners with different learning styles. Furthermore, it must be inspiring on the aspects of functionality, sophistication and creativity; it would be better if there are paintings in learning common especially the colorful ones to improve the over-all aesthetics and most importantly, it should be practical where real learning can take place.

Finally, Ms. Fresnido concluded by listing the essential components of learning commons and these include the computer workstations and clusters like that of a service desk, collaborative learning spaces or group study spaces that facilitate participatory learning and group study room which can accommodate 4 to 12 persons. A variety of furniture configurations is a must in an educational space design like learning common, and also computer work areas, Internet cafes and lounge areas, presentation support centers and lastly, an electronic classroom for information literacy classes or staff training.

Being the heart of an educational institution, any library should be steadfast in adapting to the recent developments and innovations to continuously satisfy the varying needs of the twenty-first century learners and meet the challenges brought about by the age of information technology. Because of these, the seminar only made the attendees realize more that indeed only change is permanent in this world.

was included among the itineraries. In the afternoon, the group attended the "International Forum on Trends and Transformation 2013: Managing Collections in an Electronic Environment" held at the Kasetsart University Library. The forum organized by iGroup Asia Pacific Ltd. headed by Mr. Peter Chung, Regional Sales Director of iGroup. Mr. Chung discussed about iGroup and the value of eBooks and eJournals in research. Another speaker, Mr. Carlos Eclevia, Senior Sales & Marketing Executive of iGroup, explained the various models of selecting and acquiring e-resources for libraries. Afterward, it was Ms. Eclevia's turn to deliver her talk on "Librarians' View: Easy and Effective Ways to Advertise your Resources in a Hybrid Environment." She discussed the latest trends on libraries and some marketing tips to promote electronic resources and library databases.

After the forum, the group had the chance to explore the library of Kasetsart called the Office of the University Library, a Green Library. Currently, it has two buildings: the ChuangKasetSilapakarn Building and the Debaratana Vidhayachote Building or Kasetsart University Learning Center (KULC). Conservation and preservation of natural resources is one of the advocacies of this library. It provides a garden area for users to read under the natural learning atmosphere coupled with energy savings, in line with the green campus policy. In addition, students are allowed to organize activities and concerts in this area.

The third day ushered the participants to two libraries: the Mahidol University Library (MU) and the libraries of the Thammasat University. The Mahidol Library developed the centralized library administration system in 1986 under the name of Mahidol University Library and Information Center (MULIC) consisting of sixteen (16) faculty libraries located at Bangkok Noi, Phayathai and Salaya campuses. Through the application of the Innovative Integrated System for library automation in 1990, MU Library system has grown substantially with strong collections on health sciences and life sciences resources and has become one of Thailand's major academic libraries.

In the afternoon of the same day, the group proceeded to Thammasat University which has a total of eleven (11) libraries spread across 4 campuses with over one million books plus thousands of periodicals, newspaper, online databases from around the world and an AV collection of more than thirty thousand (30,000). A Thai librarian explained that Thammasat University's Library System was established along with the University itself, in 1934. The Libraries were initially a division under the Office of the Rector, but in 1963 were upgraded to an independent division, with all libraries becoming centralized under the administration of the Thammasat University Library System. In 1997, University's Thammasat Main Library (Pridi Banomyong) moved to a new location, the first underground library building in Thailand. At the same time, the Library System became a fully automated network.

October 18, the last day in Thailand, the group had their last library visit which were in Suan Dusit Rajabaht University (SDRU) known as the Office of Academic Resources and Information Technology (OARIT). They were welcomed by the Thai librarians and ushered to the conference hall where they had a short video presentation of their university and department. OARIT is a division of SDRU that provides services related to IT and various learning materials.

The group was really amazed by the various facilities seen in libraries in Bangkok; very modern, orderly, spacious with vast collections and regimented staff and patrons. Space is not really a problem for them since they have reserved space for future collections.

A word of gratitude to PAARL officers for organizing this significant activity. The group arrived in Manila around 10:30 p.m., safe and sound and filled with enthusiasm and experiences worth-treasuring! A million "Kapunka" (Thank you) to the sponsoring universities and to the UST library administrators for giving me the chance to experience this wonderful journey. Truly, this activity was very fruitful. All participants have learned so much about the latest trends and technologies in libraries.

For EBSCO updates, Mr. Josef Halos, Country Manager of EBSCO Publishing, discussed the *EBSCO Discovery Service* which provides users with access to the UST Library's entire collection via a single entry point which includes its OPAC called the Library Online Reader's Network Zone (LOReNZO) and electronic resources. He also introduced *EBSCOhost Collection Manager* (ECM) which is an easy-to-use tool for building and managing eBook and audiobook collections on *EBSCOhost*. This tool is for the use of the librarians and faculty members.

Another library electronic resource discussed was the OSIRIS. This is a comprehensive database of financial information, ratings, earnings estimates, stock data and news on global publicly listed companies, banks and insurance firms around the world. With coverage of over one hundred twenty five (125) countries, OSIRIS contains information on over thirtyseven thousand (37,000) companies. This data is sourced from a variety of Information Providers, each being an expert in its region or discipline. OSIRIS allows you to search by any combination of criteria including: geographic location, ownership, stock data, industry code or activity description, number of employees, statement items, ratios, ratings and more. Mr. Menard Pete Dacono, Business Development Manager of Bureau Van Dijk was invited to discuss the product further.

For the recently subscribed databases of the library, the following electronic resources were discussed: *IEEE Xplore Digital Library* and *Oxford Music Online*.

Mr. Brianne John Marte, Assistant Sales Manager and Ms. Angelet San Pedro, Product Specialist both from LibTech Source Philippines Inc., iGroup Asia Pacific Ltd. Affiliate, demonstrated the use of each of the aforementioned databases respectively. *IEEE Xplore Digital Library* is a powerful resource for discovery and access to scientific and technical content published by the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and its publishing partners. Meanwhile, the *Oxford Music Online* is the access point for Grove Music Online and other Oxford music reference resources.

At the end of the half-day session, librarians and library coordinators became acquainted with the different innovations of the new and upcoming electronic resources that the library offers to its patrons.

manager. Nobody holds the expertise. He added that knowing about the object's history is one of conservation's guiding principles in which an adequate knowledge of the Spanish language is important since most of the information of old records is written in this language. He said that proper conservation will not be done if the object's history is not fully known. The following topics were discussed during the five days seminar:

Day 1

- Architecture: Yesterday and Today. Key aspects, by Victor Cageao
- Preventive Conservation: Current Criteria, by Juan Antonio Herráez

Day 2

• Architecture of Museum and Planning: Architectural Organization of a Museum, by Victor Cageao

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- National Plan for Preventive Conservation, by Juan Antonio Herráez
- The Specific Case of Rehabilitating Historical Buildings for Museums, by Victor Cageao

After the presentations on the second day, the participants proceeded to a tour of the Escuela Taller de Intramuros. The Escuela Taller Program (School Workshop in Manila) is a collaborative project of the Government of Spain through the AECID and the Government of the Philippines through the NCCA. Other partners include the Technical Education and Development Authority (TESDA), Intramuros Administration, the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) and the City of Manila. This is a technical-vocational formation project carried out through the creation of a school-workshop. The actual school and practicum is held at the Revellin de Recoletos in Intramuros.

Day 3

- The Permanent Exhibit in the Museum: Planning and Organization, by Victor Cageao
- Plan of Preventive Conservation in Museums, by Juan Antonio Herráez

After discussing the phase of risk assessment, Mr. Herráez gave an activity for the participants. He divided the group into six (6). Each group is composed of six (6) people wherein majority are museum workers and few librarians. The assigned task was to present a risk assessment plan for each institution under preventive preservation projects which will be presented on the following day.

In the afternoon session, all attendees and speakers had their practical exercise through a visit to the National Museum of the Philippines.

Day 4

Plan for Preventive Conservation (2): Risk Assessment and Implementation, by Juan Antonio Herráez

After Mr. Herráez's presentation, the assigned task for each group was discussed. The group of librarians was represented by Ms. Anne Rosette Crelencia of the National Library of the Philippines. She mentioned about the problems that she encountered with the original manuscript of *Noli Me Tangere* written by Jose Rizal which is housed in their library. One of these is the environmental condition. Since the said manuscript is placed inside a vault, they cannot

monitor the humidity and temperature regularly. At times, they place the manuscript in the exhibit case whenever there is a request.

Most of the presentors work in museums. Some of the problems that they encountered in their affiliated institutions were old structures of the buildings and floods in Manila like in the case of *Casa Manila*. Other examples of old structures are the massive staircase of San Agustin Museum that leads to the monastery and choir-loft which is no longer stable.

In the afternoon session, the participants and the speakers together with the other staff of the Intramuros Administration visited the construction site of San Ignacio church. This church was built in the 16th century. It is one of the churches that was destroyed during the World War II bombings. The last place that the group visited was the *Almacenes Reales* with the reconstruction of *Almacenes* curtain wall. According to the tour guide, the people behind the restoration of the said wall are the graduates of the *Escuela Taller* program.

Day 5

During the last day of the seminar, Mr. Cageao showed pictures of some museums in Spain. Mr. Herráez on the other hand explained the environmental condition of the Philippines showing some pictures of houses and explaining how the structures affect the environmental condition. He also showed some pictures taken during their visit to the different places in the Philippines particularly Vigan in Ilocos Sur where he conducted studies on the rehabilitation of Father Burgos Museum. Some participants from the Ayala and De La Salle Museums also shared their experiences as well as the problems they encountered in their affiliated institution.

Problems in museums are almost the same all over the world with differences in geographical region, socioeconomic and cultural context. The sharing of experiences of professionals from different countries like Spain and the Philippines helps to improve the impressions and behaviour of people towards cultural heritage preservation.

The closing remarks was given by no less than the Spanish Ambassador to the Philippines Amb. *Jorge Domecq* and *Atty*. Marco Sardillo, Intramuros Administrator. This was followed by the distribution of certificates to the participants.

Fr. Aparicio presents "Lumina Pandit" exhibit

r. Angel Aparicio, O.P., Prefect of Libraries of the UST Miguel de Benavides Library presented the remarkable Lumina Pandit Exhibition during the Philippine Librarians Association, Inc. (PLAI) National Congress 2013 and General Assembly held in Arevalo, Iloilo City on November 21, 2013.



The theme of the three-day Congress (November 20-22, 2013) was "Libraries: Preservers and Promoters of Culture and Arts." In his presentation entitled "Lumina Pandit: A Contribution of the University of Santo Tomas to Philippine Culture," Fr. Aparicio pointed out the significant role of the University and its Library in nurturing the values of men who directly and indirectly have contributed to the growth and development of the Philippine nation. He added that UST has not only been a witness but an active agent of transformation of the Filipino society. These important contributions of the University were highlighted through a grand exhibition of Historical Rare Collections of the University that have accumulated for the past 400 years of its existence.

Fr. Aparicio also shared how meticulous and difficult it was to organize an enormously grand exhibit like Lumina Pandit. It took three years before the project was materialized. It entailed a lot of work, planning, coordination, manpower, and certainly, a huge amount of money and other resources needed for the success of the event. One of the most challenging stages during the project preparation was the selection of rare materials from almost ca. 30,000 volumes available at the Heritage Library, thousands of documents of the Archives and innumerable artefacts of the UST Museum. It was not an easy task, he said. The library had to limit its choices to a number of books that would not constitute a burden to the curator or to the viewer. Based on this principle, the selection of books and authors was made following the development of the University and the progressive growth of the nation. Then, through careful study and deliberation with the exhibit curator, Ms. Marian Pastor Roces of TAO, Inc. and set of consultants on the concept and stages of the exhibit, the group came up with six sections: Section 1 -Threshold 400; Section 2 - Realm of Print; Section 3 -Spheres of Change; Section 4 - Routes of Globalization; Section 5 – Nascent Nation; and Section 6 – Curve of Nationalism.

Fr. Aparicio also presented some of the significant items that were exhibited such as Baybayin documents; books like: De Revolutionibus Orbium Coelestium (1543), by Nicholaus Copernicus, Guerra Judaica (1492), by Josephus Flavius, Doctrina Christiana, en Lengua Española y Tagala, Corregida por los Religiosos de las Ordenes (1543), Compendium Manualis Navarri (1597), by Petrus Giuvara, and others.

Since the Universities play a vital role in research, study, promotion and understanding of the Filipino cultural heritage, Fr. Aparicio encouraged other institutions to take part and actively participate in cultural promotion and preservation by organizing activities like exhibits, conferences, curricular offerings, and other activities similar in nature.

This year's PLAI National Congress was organized in cooperation with the National Commission for Culture and the Arts through the National Committee on Libraries and Information Services and the National Library of the Philippines.

ove, Inspiration, C o m m i t t e d, P a s s i o n a t e and Mother are words with d i f f e r e n t meanings and yet become related as they describe one wonderful person, and that is the late Prof. Erlinda F. Flores.

She was a former chief librarian of UST Miguel de Benavides Library, one of the pioneers of Library Science in UST, well-known official in various associations of Librarians in the country, and most especially my most dearly loved professor who taught me to love my profession even more and to be of service and an inspiration to others.

Year 2001 was the time when I was still struggling whether to pursue my chosen career (Library Science (LS)) or not. I admit that it was not my first choice program in college. I was just compelled to take it due to time constraint. I failed to enrol in other major courses. And at that time, LS program was the only major that was still accepting enrolees. With good feedback I received about it, I finally decided to sign up for it.

In the first day of our major subject in Library Science, we were only about 8 students in a small classroom. This scenario gave me a hint that my chosen program would be a boring one because very few students got interested to take it. That time, I was already thinking of shifting to another major like Science, English or even History. But knowing the inconvenience it would cause me, I gave myself an opportunity to see the benefit of taking the LS course.

Until I met Ma'am Flores. She provided us with quality education experience through her motherly way of teaching. Her gentleness, wisdom, compassion and patience made me love her and appreciate the subject/s she was handling. I was always eager to come to school as early as six in the

morning so as not to be late in her 7am class. I was determined to study hard especially during exams so as not to disappoint her if I fail and I was fond of listening to her stories about family, work and life experiences. That was a turning point in my college days. She inspired me to finally pursue librarianship as my profession.

When I heard the news of her passing last year (October 27, 2012), after years of fighting with cancer, it gave a terrible pain in my heart. As her student, I could not accept the fact that the person who touched me deeply is already gone. When she died, hundreds of people like family, relatives, former students, colleagues, and friends paid their last respects at her funeral. She was laid to rest at the Himlayang Pilipino Memorial Park in Quezon City and was buried next to her husband Atty. Teofilo Flores.

Last October 2013 was the 1st year anniversary of Ma'am Flores' passing. Shedding of tears for her death is over. Instead of mourning, I believe that 'celebration of her afterlife was the right thing to do. Knowing that she is now at peace and with God, nothing is to be mournful about. Keeping her legacy and continuing her inspiring deeds should always be carried in our hearts.

It was indeed my great privilege of knowing her throughout my college years. Her commitment, work ethics, tenacity and love for her students have inspired me to somehow follow her footsteps. She is and will always be one of my inspirations in everything I do.

Thank you Ma'am Flores for guiding and inspiring me to be who and where I am today. I will always be grateful for having you as my teacher. You will always be in my heart.

Library welcomes Amb. Hirubalan V P of Singapore

The UST Miguel de Benavides Library headed by its Prefect, Rev. Fr. Angel Aparicio, OP, welcomed Amb. Hirubalan V P of the Embassy of the Republic of Singapore and his wife Mrs. Mano Hirubalan last October 18, 2013. The couple paid a visit to see the special repository of the historical materials of the University with approximately 30,000 volumes of rare books and other rare materials. Their visit was coordinated through Prof. Maria Eloisa P. de Castro from the Faculty of Arts and Letters, who also joined them in the tour.



Fr. Aparicio presented some of the precious and significant collections of the library such as the oldest books of the library *La Guerra Judaica (The Jewish War)*, by Flavius Josephus, printed in 1492. This is the only sample of incunabulum in the library; the *De Revolutionibus Orbium Coelestium*, *Libri VI*, by Nicholaus Copernicus published in

1543; Compendium Manualis Navarri, by Petrus Giuvara, printed in 1597 at the Colegio de Amacusa in Japan; facsimile copies of the first three books printed in the Philippines, the Doctrina Christiana en letra y lengua China, Doctrina Christiana, en lengua española y tagala, and the Shih-Lu or the Testimony of True Religion; and many other treasured books and old maps of the library.

They were also acquainted with the different activities that the library conducts for the preservation of the University heritage through its conservation and digitization projects. These are two of the major components of the Lumina Pandit II Program supported by the Union-Bank of the Philippines.

The couple showed enthusiasm on how these activities are being done. They observed the restoration procedures and even the materials and equipment being used. They were also informed about the library's ongoing digitization program which aims to increase the access of rare materials and to protect its original copies from deterioration due to frequent handling.

As a token of gratitude, the library sent them copies of the Catalog of Rare Books and other UST Library publications as souvenirs of their visit hoping that they will become ardent advocates of the Miguel de Benavides Library in the preservation of the past for the enlightenment and benefit of the present and future generations.

Ms. Fuchigami, Ms. Lontoc and Ms. Padilla proceeded and



USTLA just wants to learn and have fun!



They are using Dalet Digital Media Systems and Avid Unity ISIS (Infinitely Scalable Intelligent Storage) which will enable the ABS-CBN to digitize and store more hours of television content and its library of more films.

As they tour around, the group was also very fascinated as they witnessed the media transition that took place in the library from magnetic tapes to compact discs. A sample of an old magnetic tape where one of the episodes of formerly known talk show Mel & Jay is stored was shown to the group. From Mr. Salta, it is interesting to know that the people behind the transcriptions of the library contents are generally, not librarians. Most of them belong to different fields depending on the kind of program being transcribed. Like in the case of documentary programs that deal on commerce and industries, a graduate of Commerce or any related business course is highly preferred so that the topic discussed and terminologies used in the program would be more comprehensible in order to come up with a reliable transcription.

Since it was a rare opportunity and privilege to be in the premises of a TV network company, USTLA members applied the metaphor of "hitting two birds with one stone." Aside from the library tour, they took advantage of enjoying their leisure time inside the ABS-CBN compound by watching the popular noontime variety show, It's Showtime. Towards a more engaging library



The extensive renovation at the first floor of the library which started third week of October 2013 is nearing completion, creating a more engaging and flexible spaces within the library. The following are the improvements that have been made:

- the foyer at the library entrance was repainted to protect, preserve and also to boost the library's interior appeal;
- the monumental **Circulation counter** has been demolished; it now serves as an area for exhibit/ display of the **printing press** replica;
- two new **electronic signages** have been acquired which can be used either indoor or outdoor;

- General Circulation area is conveniently relocated at the Left Wing (Grd. Flr.) adjacent to the Current Serials section and General Reference & Information Section; the long proposed renovation of the section has finally materialized;
- Current Serials Section will occupy large portion at the Left Wing (Grd. Flr.) where current issues of general and professional periodical literature in local and international publication and newspapers in microfilms together with the microfilm reader are available
- **Photocopying station** has been relocated temporarily near the Conference Hall.

Library represents a unique place in campuses. Symbolically, it represents the heart of an academic institution. Improvement of its facilities provides a more conducive and pleasing atmosphere for students to learn.
