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Nutrinet Zoominar

On December 7, 2023, The Nutrition Research Information Network (NutriNet) Zoominar conducted a free webinar entitled "*Disaster Planning for Libraries*," held via Zoom and Facebook Live and approved with two (2) Continuous Professional Development (CPD) points for librarians. The webinar aimed to create awareness among librarians and other information resource personnel about library disaster planning.

The resource speaker was Ms. Eimee Rhea C. Lagrama, deputy University librarian of the University of the Philippines, Diliman.

Ms. Lagrama discussed the following aspects of planning and preparation for disaster management for libraries:

- 1. Disaster Preparedness Plan includes the existing working environment, self-coordination and movement, damaged materials, financial and insurance, and the final evaluation of returning to normal working conditions.
- 2. Disaster recovery refers to reviewing disaster preparedness response programs, a proper and essential recovery plan, a document recovery program, reflection, evaluation, and restart programs.
- **3. Identifying the Hazard Factors** includes the physical form, civil disturbance, fire, and flooding.
- **4. Tasks in Disaster Preparedness** are setting priorities, setting disaster responsiveness, and establishing support networks.
- **5. Setting priorities (Task #1)** refers to identifying vital records, prioritizing records, preparing priority lists per section, and agreeing on priority lists.
- 6. Disaster Response Team (Task #2) includes disaster coordination, a finance officer who allocates funds, a security officer, a response/recovery officer, and documentation.
- **7. Emergency Management Program** is important to prevent/minimize the loss of collectives in institutions in cases of disorders or emergencies.
- **8. Tasks in Disorder Prevention** identify, eliminate, and reduce all the risks.
- Stefan Michalski's "10 Agents of Determinants" includes light ultraviolet, incorrect temperature, incorrect relative humidity, pollutants, pests, physical forces, fire and water, thieves, vandalism, and custodial neglect.

An open forum followed after the discussion.

Indeed, the forum was helpful for library management and also beneficial in guiding librarians and other disaster personnel to be able to survive during library disasters and to be able to deal promptly with other library emergencies.

Through active participation, individuals and the community gain spiritual nourishment, thus promoting values as the library staff serves the Thomasian community.




Forum on "Holy Bible"

In celebration of the 'National Bible Month', the Human Values Committee hosted an interactive forum entitled "Holy Bible: Relevance and Impact to the Modern Times." This was held on January 29, 2024, at the Miguel de Benavides Library Conference Hall and through FB live. This engaging event was attended by the Junior High School, Education High School, and Senior High School students, as well as the Bachelor of Library and Information Science (BLIS) practicumers from the College of Education.

The forum's primary objective was to encourage the youth to read the Bible, emphasizing the importance of under-



standing its relevance in contemporary culture. Aligned with this year's theme, "**God's Word: the breath of new** *life*," as highlighted by the National Bible Society, the event drew inspiration from Genesis 2:7 and 2 Timothy 3:16-17.

Rev. fr. Wenifredo "Jojie" Padilla, III, OP STL-MA, SSL, an instructor at the UST Faculty of Sacred Theology, delivered a compelling talk discussing the significance of understanding the Bible's narratives for the younger generation. Fr. Jojie emphasized that the true essence of the Bible lies not in its mere possession but in its active readership. The forum aimed to achieve several objectives, with the primary goal of enlightening and inspiring the youth to read and understand the Bible:

- to encourage and reach out to the Gen Z to read the Bible and be able to relate it to their everyday lives;
- to understand why there is a need for the revision of the Bible, which is not to change its core message but to update its language and context to make it more accessible and relevant to modern readers. This process has been ongoing for centuries and is necessary to ensure the Bible remains a living document;
- to analyze the cultural relevance of the Pinoy version of the Bible; and
- to observe the National Bible Day.



E-libraries for a progressive learning community Jr. Lib. Marissa A. Chua

Last February 27, 2024, the DOST--STII Library Webinar, in partnership with the Benita & Catalino Yap Foundation, conducted a webinar with the topic "*Taking the Path of Innovation towards Future-proof Learning*" in celebration of the 2024 Philippine Innovation Month. The session aimed to help participants to have a deeper understanding of the processes involved in establishing an e-library that adapts to the current needs and demands of 21st-century library patrons and learners. It gave a better view of locating and strategically utilizing online educational resources.

The session started with the first topic, "Innovate to Educate: Building a 21st Century e-Library for your School **Community**," as discussed by resource speaker Mr. Chito N. Angeles from the University of the Philippines, Diliman. He shed light on how the electronic library, mainly known as e-library, has evolved and transformed through time, together with today's innovations and technological advancements. According to Mr. Angeles, e-libraries give innumerable advantages to individuals as they offer accessibility to a wide range of people capable of acquiring relevant and reliable information anytime and anywhere. Through its enhanced search capabilities, the e-library is proven to be a robust support for web-based learning and teaching. It removes various barriers, especially physical barriers, to allow users to maximize information resources from different databases.



Mr. Angeles also reiterated the significant components of an electronic library, which are (1) resources, (2) services, and (3) technological infrastructure. First, a library should have vast resources like local digital collections, open-access e-resources, subscribed e-resources, and open educational resources. These can provide users with a quick and easy way of discovering diverse digital content, allowing them to choose whatever topic interests them and search for related content, which is much more extensive than a physical

library can offer. Second, e-library services should be provided, such as laptop circulation/lending, BYOD or Bring Your Own Device, eBook lending, and virtual reference services. Because of this, the role of librarians has become more significant in facilitating an effective e-library that students and teachers can enjoy and benefit from. Third, technological infrastructure is also vital in an e-library as it provides platforms to enhance access to e-resources. Although building an e-library may seem challenging and complicated, school communities should consider its benefit to the growth and learning of its members.



The final part of the webinar, "Digital Goldmines: Discovering Educational Resources on the Internet," was conducted by resource speaker Ms. Jennifer B. Dimasaca from the National Library of the Philippines. She talked about the upside of creating an electronic library, considering the large amount of data exchanged in this digital age. As we live in a digital universe, she highlighted how the mining cycle, from introduction, exploration, discovery, development, production, reclamation, reference, and closing, relates to building a successful e-library, one which facilitates a diverse learning experience that equips the clientele in the digital world. Through the expertise of librarians, they can serve as instruments in assisting patrons navigate through abundant data and knowledge. Further, there is a need to follow a more structured and systematic approach to building an electronic library, including conducting surveys to know the target audience's preferences for sourcing high-quality, credible materials. Building an e-library may require significant investment in time, money, and the expertise of qualified professionals. Still, it can positively impact users' learning and professional success by providing up-to-date, scholarly information.

Coinciding with the title guessing is a "**Bring Me**" game with a twist. Instead of random objects, participants need to present the book to any library staff. A sweet treat awaits the winner who gets the requested item. With this activity, learners' awareness and library knowledge were gauged.
